What, then, must we do?.

When all the people asked John, 'What must we do?' he answered, 'If anyone has two tunics he must share with the man who has none, and the one with something to eat must do the same.' There were tax collectors too who came for baptism, and these said to him, 'Master, what must we do?' He said to them, 'Exact no more than your rate.' Some soldiers asked him in their turn, 'What about us? What must we do?' He said to them, 'No intimidation! No extortion! Be content with your pay!' A feeling of expectancy had grown among the people, who were beginning to think that John might be the Christ, so John declared before them all, 'I baptise you with water, but someone is coming, someone who is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to undo the strap of his sandals; he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing-fan is in his hand to clear his threshing-floor and to gather the wheat into his barn; but the chaff he will burn in a fire that will never go out.' As well as this, there were many other things he said to exhort the people and to announce the Good News to them.

Reflection on the Crib and the Third Sunday of Advent

The Crib: A Symbol of Humility and God's Love. The crib, also known as the Nativity scene, is one of the most profound symbols of Advent and Christmas. It depicts the humble birth of Jesus in a manger, surrounded by Mary, Joseph, shepherds, and the animals. The simplicity of the crib reflects the humility of God, who chose to come into the world not in grandeur but in the lowliest of places. For us, the crib is a visual reminder of God's immense love and His desire to dwell among us. It invites us to reflect on the values of simplicity, humility, and service. The empty crib during Advent also symbolizes our hearts awaiting the arrival of Christ. It challenges us to prepare a spiritual dwelling for Him by embracing forgiveness, generosity, and love.

The Third Sunday of Advent: Gaudete Sunday

The Third Sunday of Advent, known as Gaudete Sunday, is a moment of joy in the midst of Advent's season of preparation and repentance. The term Gaudete comes from the Latin word meaning "rejoice," drawn from the entrance antiphon: "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say, rejoice. The Lord is near." (Philippians 4:4-5).

The liturgical colour for this Sunday is rose, symbolizing a lightening of the penitential purple of Advent. It signifies that we are drawing closer to the celebration of Christ's birth.

The readings for this Sunday emphasize joy and

The First Reading often speaks of God's promises of restoration and salvation. The Second Reading encourages us to be patient and steadfast, trusting in the Lord's faithfulness. The Gospel highlights John the Baptist, who prepares the way for Jesus and reminds us of His coming as the source of true joy.

Connection Between the Crib and Gaudete Sunday

The crib and Gaudete Sunday share a common theme: joy rooted in the presence of God. The crib reminds us that Jesus came into the world to bring salvation, peace, and hope. Gaudete Sunday urges us to celebrate that this promise is near fulfillment. Together, they call us to rejoice, not in material things, but in the profound truth that God is with us (Emmanuel).

Application for Our Lives

As we reflect on the crib and this joyful Sunday, let us ask ourselves: Are we preparing our hearts like the crib empty, humble, and ready to welcome Jesus? Do we allow the joy of the Lord to overcome our anxieties and struggles? This Advent, let the crib inspire us to embrace simplicity and humility, and let Gaudete Sunday renew our hope and joy. May we carry this joy into our homes and communities, becoming signs of Christ's love for others.

Conclusion

The crib and the Third Sunday of Advent teach us that true joy is found in the presence of God. As we prepare for Christmas, let us rejoice in the Lord, who chose to dwell among us, and let our lives become cribs where Christ can be born anew.






