

Jesus told a parable to his disciples: 'Can one blind man guide another? Surely both will fall into a pit? The disciple is not superior to his teacher; the fully trained disciple will always be like his teacher. Why do you observe the splinter in your brother's eye and never notice the plank in your own? How can you say to your brother, "Brother, let me take out the splinter that is in your eye," when you cannot see the plank in your own? Hypocrite! Take the plank out of your own eye first, and then you will see clearly enough to take out the splinter that is in your brother's eye.

'There is no sound tree that produces rotten fruit, nor again a rotten tree that produces sound fruit. For every tree can be told by its own fruit: people do not pick figs from thorns, nor gather grapes from brambles. A good man draws what is good from the store of goodness in his heart; a bad man draws what is bad from the store of badness. For a man's words flow out of what fills his heart.'

BACKGROUND ON THE GOSPEL READING

The third and final section of Luke's Sermon on the Plain begins: And he told them a parable. There are actually four parables, three of which we read today. They are all about how to be a good disciple.

The blind cannot lead the blind. And a disciple cannot be a good disciple unless he or she has learned from the teacher. Everyone who is fully trained is like the teacher who knows how to cure the blind. Before you can be a good disciple and teach others you must take care of yourself. Do not try to take a speck out of your brother's eye until you have taken the board out of your own. Finally, only when you have purified yourself can you produce the good works that the teacher requires. Discipleship asks us to produce good deeds. But to produce them requires the integrity and purity of heart found in the teacher. When people see your good deeds they will know that this is because you have a good heart.

The final parable, which we do not read today, is about building on the solid foundation of rock and not on sand. This is the only way to face the difficulties a disciple will encounter and survive.

This Wednesday is the first day of Lent, Ash Wednesday. Lent is a special time when we prepare ourselves for Good Friday and Easter Sunday.





If you go to Mass on Ash Wednesday, the priest will make a little cross on your forehead with ashes. The ashes remind us that

people were made from the dust of the ground and that some day we will die and go back into the ground.

It is good for us to remember that we will die one day. It helps us realize that God put us here and that we need Him all the time. If we remember how much we need God then we will think of Him more and love Him more.



ASH WEDNESDAY AND THE SEASON OF LENT: A CALL TO RENEWAL

Introduction

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ.

As we enter the sacred season of Lent with Ash Wednesday, we are reminded of our call to repentance, renewal, and a deeper union with God. 5. Living Lent as a Family

- Set up a prayer space at home for daily Lenten reflections.
- Encourage children to offer simple sacrifices with joy. • Read and meditate on the Passion narratives together.

Lent is a sacred invitation to return to the Lord with all our hearts. It is a time to embrace simplicity, seek holiness, and prepare ourselves for the joy of Easter. Let us journey together as a parish community, supporting one another in prayer, sacrifice, and love. May this season bring us closer to Christ, renew our faith, and transform our hearts.
